

ender sensitivity has been a buzz Uterminology in this generation. Most youths are 'woke' when it comes to the controversial SOGIE or sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression. With this, gender issues and some "traditions" do not work well together nowadays. What has been commonly practiced a year ago may not be widely accepted today – like the crossdressing pageant of men perceived as "straight" that made waves on social media.

Two colleges of the university have long practiced a tradition of straight men crossdressing in pageantry as a means of entertainment during socializations. Back then, students enjoyed it and had no complaints as to how it was conducted. It has even been an iconic and anticipated event with tarpaulins along the Main Campus pathway and social media cards as teasers. Last year, the event shifted online, and no one made a fuss out of it.

This year, the tables seemingly turned when a particular college uploaded social media teasers of the supposed candidates. The Facebook update was frowned upon and

netizens within and outside the university's circle. People all over Facebook labeled both the university and the college as "insensitive" to the plight of the LGBTQIA+ members. It was also concluded that the event promotes gender discrimination and is extremely offensive. This hatred prompted the uploader, the college student council, to turn down the post after a day.

Some of the comments claimed that straight men are not allowed to crossdress since they are not transgender women and they do not identify as female. This poses a question now if crossdressing is exclusively for transgender men and women. Furthermore, the crossdressing part is seen as a mockery to LGBTQIA+ members who still find it difficult to express themselves. With the emergence of SOGIE, does gender expression come with a hard and fast rule on how to dress up and express oneself? Are people more sensitive now regarding gender issues, or have they become too insensitive on the fast paced gender landscape?

Others defended the pageant, saying

received hundreds of angry reactions from it could be a form of support to the LGBTQIA+ members as to gender expression. There was even a TV show drag contest competitor who admitted he was a straight guy, but he was still allowed to continue in the show. However, the college student council lacked in rationalizing the activity's true purpose. They failed to enlighten netizens on the event's rationale. The Facebook post has a portion for caption, yet it was not efficiently utilized to lay down their purpose and objectives. Instead, they deleted the post, and took a while to come up with either an update or apology.

In this world where gender issues are hotly debated, it is inevitable to continue traditions and practices that may run over one's SOGIE. In this age where people are empowered to voice their thoughts on social media, it is easy to go viral with just one click. Yet people need not banter or fight from time to time when these gender issues arise. Educating a wider majority holds a higher place than picking fights in situations like this. In the long-standing battle for gender equality, it is undoubtedly more appropriate to gain allies than enemies.



Retired TSU graduate school professor launches 2nd book about Santa Ignacia town

Dr. Emiliano F. Dacayanan, a retired graduate school professor at Tarlac College of Technology (now TSU), officially released his second book of poetry, music, and writing about the Santa İgnacia town in Tarlac during his 97th birthday on October 12, 2022.

Dr. Dacayanan's book, "Homey Poems, Selected Articles, and Manuscripts, etc. (Santa Ignacia, Tarlac & Beyond)," is a 20-year collection of his literary pieces, articles, and manuscripts about his hometown.

Like his first book, "Santa Ignacia: Then and Now," his second book was co-published by the TSU Center for Tarlaqueño Studies last 2021 under the leadership of Dr. Lino L. Dizon, former CTS head, now a commissioner of the National Historical Commission of the Philippines.

During the launching program, Executive Assistant to the TSU President Dr. Brigido B. Corpuz and CTS head Prof. Jose Russell S. Arador formally presented the book on behalf of the university. In a speech, Dr. Corpuz mentioned that Dr. Dacayanan had contributed much to local history through his published books.

In response, Dr. Dacayanan said in a message that at 97 years old and with all his accomplishments, he is already a "fulfilled man."



"Mahirap naming isinulat ito dahil nawala na 'yung mga dating naisulat ko. Pero yung mga anak ko may naitago pa. Kaya nung sinabi ko na nagsusulat pa ako ng mga tula at poem sa Amerika, hinanap nila 'yung mga iba pang sinulat ko, at sinabi nila na ang kapal na ng libro ko," he said in Ilocano.

Copies of this book will be forwarded to the National Library of the Philippines and several university libraries, such as the TSU and Tarlac Agricultural University libraries, as well as to the University of Hawaii and Yale

University, both of which have Asian Studies and Philippine Studies, according to Dr. Corpuz.

Dr. Dacayanan also gave away complimentary copies of his book to guests at the launch.

Aside from his published books, he is also credited for composing the municipal hymn of Santa Ignacia that was approved in 2014 by former town mayor Saklulu B. Enrado and endorsed by then municipal vice president mayor Noel C. Antonio.

Dr. Dacayanan taught at TCT during the presidency of Dr. Dolores Matias. He is an educator, poet, writer, and musician. He also wrote for educational magazines and contributed to the TCT college journal.



New university administration, LGU Capas sustain TSU Capas Campus partnership

Tarlac State University and the local L government of Capas, both under new administrations, renewed the memorandum of agreement (MOA) for the continued operations of the TSU Capas Campus.

at the Cristo Rey covered court in Capas, Tarlac on October 26, 2022.

The TSU Capas Campus currently offers three courses, namely Bachelor of Public Administration, Bachelor of Elementary Education, and Bachelor of Science in Criminology.



In terms of campus improvement, Capas mayor Roseller "Boots" Rodriguez said that the LGU purchased and installed three 65-inch Smart television sets in the classrooms and upgraded the campus' internet connection to 150 Mbps. He added the local government's plans to refurbish the school canteen and put up a computer laboratory, library, and study hubs on the campus.

"Our national government makes education affordable kasi libre na ang college [education]. TSU is making education in Capas accessible kasi hindi niyo na kailangang pumunta ng Tarlac City para mag-aral. Accessible na kasi nandito na sa bayan natin sa Capas. Pinagbigyan tayo ng TSU na dito kayo sa Capas mag-aaral at magtatapos ng kurso na gusto ninyo," he said.

Regarding transportation the teaching staff, the municipal mayor will give transportation allowance to professors and lecturers assigned to this campus.

Another plan for the LGU-funded The signing ceremony took place campus is the inclusion of business courses among its program offerings. However, this will depend on the arrangements with the university.

> Meanwhile, according to Mayor Rodriguez, the local government unit is planning to give scholarship slots to Capas Campus students through the Capas LGU Scholarship Program amounting to 6,000 pesos per semester. Maintaining average for scholars is 82.



Moreover, Mayor Rodritguez shared that Senator Imee Marcos affirmed and allotted three million pesos for student scholarships. From this, 1,000 students from Capas and Concepcion will benefit from a 3,000-peso cash assistance on November 24.

In addition, third district representative Cong. Noel "Bong" Rivera also committed to provide 400 slots of scholarship grants to Capas students.

BAC infra chair: 'TSU abides by the laws mandated in gov't procurement'

Aimed at equipping prospective and current suppliers regarding government procurement processes, the Tarlac State University's Procurement Unit organized the Suppliers' Forum last October 28, 2022, at the TSU Main AVR.

Conducted via a hybrid format, the forum is an avenue where suppliers can raise their concerns and queries regarding TSU's implementation of the procurement law or Republic Act No. 9184. This annual activity is



conducted in accordance with the Philippine government's governing principles and

'Yung forum po na ganito, ang pinaka-aim niya ay i-ensure na mayroon pong access ang mga prospective bidders po na katulad ninyo sa TSU. İt will be both beneficial po sa amin at sa inyo 'yung mga ganitong fora dahil, basically, magkukumustahan po tayo at puwede niyo pong sabihin sa amin how could we ease things for you [when] doing business with TSU. But of course, not going beyond the ambits of what the law requires," Prof. Gherold C. Benitez, Student Affairs and Services Director and Bids and Awards Committee (BAC)-Goods and Services Technical Working Group (TWG) member, said.

Moreover, the activity serves as a channel to assure both the university administration and suppliers that TSÚ "strictly follows the implementing rules and regulations" (IRR) of the law, as mentioned by Bids BAC-Infrastructure Chairperson Engr. Pedro G. Suerte-Felipe Jr., also the Business Affairs and Auxiliary Services Office Director.

"Being suppliers of the government, you are already aware of the ins and outs of the public procurement process. Rest assured that Tarlac State University abides by the law (RA 9184) mandated in the government procurement, and we strictly follow the IRR as much as possible, as much as we can understand the rules and regulations," he said.

The forum is also a chance for the university to improve and continuously provide excellent customer service and strengthen the agency-client relationship.

"And our BAC members, and even our TWGs and secretariat, are constantly [strengthening] their proficiencies in the procurement regulations and processes in order that they would be able to perform their functions effectively. Also, we are constantly trying to streamline the processes, but without dispensing with the prescribed rules and procedures," he added.

Showing his support, TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco thanked the suppliers and prospective bidders for doing business with TSU despite the intricacies of the law. Mr. Ronnie Dungo, Executive Secretary to the TSU President, read Pres. Velasco's message.

"The law requires that government agencies issue bid proposals and solicit replies from businesses throughout this extremely formal process. The lowest bidder receives the contract after all responses have been received. It is a very delicate procedure. But with you (suppliers) being around, it is easier and more convenient for us," Mr. Dungo read.

"To our respected and prospective bidders of Tarlac State University, we strive for effective procurement procedures, which implies a value for money, which means purchasing items that are appropriate for the task, but also taking into account the total cost that will benefit our clients — our students, employees, and other stakeholders," he added.

Among the questions raised by suppliers during the open forum are about the bidding timeline, approval of projects, bank payments, purchase orders, and delivery schedule.

These were addressed representatives from the Procurement Unit. Supply and Property Management Unit, and the BAC members, TWG, and secretariat.

The Alumni Park, located at the "mini forest" at the back of the College of Criminal Justice Education building (formerly Laboratory School), is intended as a recreational space for students, personnel, visiting alumni, and other guests.

Its first phase features initial landscaping, some benches, and the park entrance sign with a marker detailing the history of the Laboratory School Mini Forest.

"The late Prof. Armando Alamo, principal of TSU-Institute of Rural Life and Technology (previous name of the Laboratory School), required all students from the first to fourth year to plant 12 trees every year of their enrollment," the marker read.

"The succeeding administration of the newly renamed Laboratory School, headed by Prof. Crisanto B. Mendoza (TSU Laboratory School Director), continued the practice of tree planting even after the decree was enacted," the marker further read.

The marker also states that the alumni park construction is a means to "nurture" the mini forest, which is a fitting tribute to the university's alumni.

The TSU Alumni Park is a concept of the TSU Alumni Affairs Office led by Dr. Winston F. Abalos as early as 2019. This is in collaboration with the university for the landscaping design and the TSUAAI for the financing.

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opportunities [and] undertakings to bring beneficence to both our institutions. We anticipate deliverables from research projects and programs to include potentials affecting key results in propelling TSU as a top sustainable university," University Research Office OIC Director Dr. Marcos said in a statement.

Some activities include student, faculty, and researcher exchange; collaborative research and extension projects; lectures, symposia, and capacitybuilding programs; academic information and materials exchange; mentor-mentee collaboration; and laboratory and training services availment.

The MOU is valid for five years and may be renewed subject to review and renegotiation.

According to Dir. Matias, it was TSU who sought assistance from UPLB. She said the partnership talk started during the FTRC's Chicharon Camiling project, where the proponents availed their training for chemical analysis.


